Driving Directions:

ITEMS OF INTEREST

Oklahoma research: Oklahoma conducted its first State Census in 1890. This is the only official, documented census of that area at that time. It is available at Ancestry.com or the Oakland Family History Center, although the microfilm at the FHC does not include as many counties as does the Ancestry.com site. **Oklahoma Census Records: 1890** – gives information on race, gender, age and family relationship. Also to be found at Oakland FHC – Oklahoma 1890 Veterans Schedule (Confederate).

<u>Alameda Library Book Sale:</u> Sponsored by the Friends group. A giant used book sale, and a wonderful opportunity to gather history books and biographies especially...Free to the public.

Want to start your personal Blog (Web log)? Here are Bill George's pointers.

How to set up a free Web Log (Blog) ---

Go to http://www.gmail.com (Google) and sign up for a free email account. Log into the account Go to http://www.blogger.com Click on "Create a Blog" Name your Blog Type in a Title (will be displayed at the top of your blog). Type in a unique Name that will be used to read your blog. Type in the Word Verification characters, and press ENTER. Choose your Template and press ENTER You now have a Blog, to be accessed by typing http://yournamehere.blogspot.com Type something in and click on the HELP button to receive extensive instructions on how to edit your post. Click on "PUBLISH POST" to update your blog. To add more posts, just go to http://www.blogger.com, log in and click on "New Post".

Homestead Act of 1862: The Homestead Act of 1862 was passed by the U. S. Congress. It provided for the transfer of 160 acres of unoccupied public land to each homesteader on payment of a nominal fee after 5 years of residence. Land could also be acquired after 6 months of residence at \$1.25 an acre. The government had previously sold land to settlers in the West for revenue purposes. As the West became politically stronger, however, pressure was increased upon Congress to guarantee free land to settlers,. Several bills providing for free distribution of land were defeated in Congress. In 1860, a bill was passed in Congress but was vetoed by President Buchanan. With the ascendancy of the Republican party (which had committed itself to homestead legislation) and with the secession of the South (which had opposed free distribution of land), the Homestead Act, sponsored by Galusha A. Grow, became law. In 1976 it expired in all the states but Alaska, where it ended in 1986.

You Never Know What You Might Find Buried in the Law Books

The following list of wars is part of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 205. I stumbled on this list when I was doing research on non-profit versus association legal code.

The list as presented in the code is not chronological. But, if you had an ancestor "disappear", take a look at this list. Maybe they went off to fight in a war, or maybe they were civilians caught up in a war.

205. The veteran's exemption is as specified in subdivisions (o), (p), (q) and (r) of Section 3 of Article XIII of the Constitution.

The following are **wars** under subdivisions (o), (p), (q), and (r) of Section 3 of Article XIII of the Constitution:

- (a) Revolutionary War, April 19, 1775-January 14, 1784.
- (b) Second War With England, June 18, 1812-February 17, 1815
- (c) Black Hawk War, April 6, 1832-August 2, 1832
- (d) War With Mexico, April 24, 1846- May 30, 1848
- (e) Civil War, April 18, 1861-August 20, 1866
- (f) War With Spain, April 21, 1898-April 11, 1899
- (g) War in Philippines, April 321, 1899-July 4, 1902
- (h) Chinese Relief Expedition, June 20, 1900-May 15, 1901
- (i) Campaign against the Rogue River, Yakima, Nez Perce, and Snake Indians in Oregon and Washington 1855-1856
- (j) Campaign against the Indians in southern Oregon and Idaho and northern California and Nevada, 1865-1868
- (k) Campaign against the Cheyennes, Arapahoes, Kiowas, and Comanches in Kansas, Colorado, and Indian Territory, 1867-1869
- (1) Modoc War, 1872-1873
- (m)Campaign against the Apaches in Arizona, 1873.
- (n) Campaign against the Kiowas, Comanches, and Cheyennes in Kansas, Colorado, Texas, Indian Territory, and New Mexico, 1874-1875.
- (o) Campaign against the Northern Cheyennes and Sioux, 1876-1877
- (p) Nez Perce War, 1877
- (q) Bannock War, 1878
- (r) Campaign against the Northern Cheyennes, 1878-1879
- (s) Campaign against the Ute Indians in Colorado and Utah, September, 1879-November, 1880
- (t) Campaign against the Apache Indians in Arizona, 1885-1886
- (u) Campaign against the Sioux Indians in South Dakota, November, 1890-January, 1893
- (v) War With Germany-Austria, April 6, 1917-November 11, 1918
- (w) Campaign against the Apache Indians in Arizona, 1895-1896
- (x) World War II, December 7, 1941-January 1, 1947

- (y) Campaign against the North Koreans and Chinese Communists in Korea, June 27, 1950-January 31, 1955
- (z) Campaign against the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Communists in South Vietnam, August 5, 1964-May 8, 1975

The following are campaigns under the subdivisions (o), (p), (q), and (r) of Section 3 of Article XIII of the Constitution:

- (a) First Nicaraguan campaign.
- (b) Second Nicaraguan campaign
- (c) Yangtze River campaign in China
- (d) All other campaigns for service in which a medal has been issued by the Congress of the United States.
