## NEWS YOU CAN USE

**Digitized Newspapers:** The British Library in London has announced it is digitizing up to 40 million pages of newspapers, including fragile dailies dating back 250 years. Once digitized, the British newspapers documenting local, regional and national life spanning to the 1700s will be fully searchable and accessable online, the national library said. The vast majority of the British Library's 759 million pages of newspapers – the largest collections in the world – are currently available only on microfilm or bound in bulky volumes. **<u>Preservation – Paper:</u>** Paper is probably the most common item you have to store and wish to preserve; i.e: B/M/D. certificates, important records and photographs. These items should be stored at roughly 72 degrees with 50% humidity. Most living spaces meet this criteria, with the exceptions of attics, basements and garages.

Your lovely colored wedding photographs could suffer damage before your 25<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary if not stored properly.

Place papers and prized photographs in archival folders or archival sleeves, or copy information onto archival paper. Never put acidic paper with archival paper, especially newsprint.

Scanning photos and documents and preserving them on CDs and/or printing them on archival paper will help to keep them for many generations to come. Copy your those CDs onto a new CD or a new medium every few years to insure their preservations. Store in cool (not cold), dry atmosphere. (Gen. Soc. of Benicia & Vallejo *Taproot*, V.12, No.8 – excerpted & edited)

**Epidemics from 1657 to 1918:** Use this as a guide as it is not a complete reference, There were more or less constant epidemics of typhoid throughout the late 1800s and into the 1900s. During epidemics birth certificates were not always issued because people didn't go where they didn't have to go. This list of known epidemics makes a helpful reference when researching individuals who disappear from local records suddenly, with no record of death. During major epidemics people were often buried hurriedly and sometimes in mass graves.

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#### SOLANO COUNTY, CALIFORNIA – A Thumbnail Sketch

Solano is an original county established in 1850. It is located almost half way between San Francisco and Sacramento, in the Bay-Delta Region. The county seat is Fairfield and the largest city is Vallejo. The population in 2000 was over 394,000.

Gold miners arriving in San Francisco during the Gold Rush Era traveled through this region to reach the gold fields. The county is home to part of the San Pablo Bay National Wildlife Refuge, Travis Air Force Base, Benicia Capital State Historical Park and Vallejo Naval & History Museum. Several cinnabar mines were worked in the county during the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

In 1854, Mare Island, off the coast of the city of Vallejo was purchased by the government and became the first U.S. Naval Shipyard. In 1941 it employed over 18,000 people and was of major economic benefit to the city of Vallejo. The government closed the shipyard in 1993 and ownership has since reverted back to Solano County. It is listed in the National Record of Historic Districts and Vallejo is gradually restoring the island and preserving much of its history.

Genealogical Society of Vallejo-Benicia meets at the Vallejo National Historic Museum in Vallejo. On their website is a long list of names their members have transcribed from tombstones in the Carquinez Cemetery.
