ITEMS OF INTEREST

Record Dates Correctly: If you were recording a date, such as, August 10, 2007 in your records and you wrote 8/10/07 or 10/8/07 know that, either way, it could mistakenly be interpreted as October 8, 2007. Either record dates in their entirety, or if you must abbreviate, use 10 Aug 07 or 10 Aug 2007. Future generations of genealogists will encounter a lot of stumbling blocks - don't add to the confusion.

The Tennessee State Public Library: <http://tnsos.net/TSLA/Bibleproject/> The library has put on line a collection of 1,500 family bibles that the library has been collecting since the 1920s. The collections consists of scans of all the pages in the bibles that contain notations ; such as, dates of birth, baptism and marriage of various family members. Access is free. This is a work in progress: so far surnames A through J have been indexed.

A Guardian When the Parents Are Not Dead: Do not assume that because a child has a guardian appointed for him that the parents of that child are dead. A Maryland relative in 1817 gave money to two grandchildren and then appointed a guardian to oversee their inheritance. The parents of the child were still alive and their mother was the daughter of the man writing the will. The parents were not named as the guardians of their children's inheritance. The writer of the will was likely trying to avoid the son-in-law having any control over the grandchildren's inheritance. Giving the money directly to the daughter in 1817 would have realistically meant that the son-in-

law controlled it. Giving it to the grandchildren and appointing someone else to oversee it took care of that. (Genealogy Tip of the Day, 21 Oct 2014, via Monterey County Gen. Soc Newsletter Jan/Feb 2015)

Primogeniture: A legal term...The state of being born first of the same parents; seniority by birth among children. In law, the right which belongs to the eldest son or daughter.

Until the 20th century, male primogeniture was the rule in Britain - the right to inherit the estate of the father belonged to the eldest son and, in the royal family, the eldest son of the king is entitled to the throne. However, among the females and if there is no male heir, the crown descends to the eldest daughter only and her issue.

Rules of Primogeniture: Primogeniture means the preference in inheritance according to law, custom or usage historically to the eldest son or his issue, or in exceptional cases, to the line of the eldest daughter.

The United States gives succession of estates to all legitimate children without distinction and disregarding all consideration of primogeniture. But the US law differs from Justinian law in the lineal descendants, if they stand in equal degree from the common ancestor, share equally per capita.

Conversely, under Roman law the right was paid to "the right of representation" where each lineal branch of descendants took only the portion which their parent would have taken had he been living, the division being per stirpes and not per capita. When such lineal descendants stand in unequal degrees of consanguinity, the inheritance is per stirpes and not per capita. (stirpes means progenitor of family) (Ontario Gen Soc. BOOK REVIEW

"Arizona Adventure"

Action packed true tales of Arizona: By Marshall Trimble

"Opening of the Southwest's Last Frontier", a chapter about midway in the book, tells about the advance of the railroad through northern Arizona and the resulting growth of the Flagstaff area.

One tale relates to a newspaper article about a Capt. Bullwinkle, notorious poker player and another cattleman named, Vanderlip. Vanderlip came to town hoping to play poker with Bullwinkle, but with no money. They agreed to play for stock. After several hands, Bullwinkle left the table owning seven hundred sixty-two steers, heifers, etc., and a big stock ranch.

There is a lot of Arizona early history in this book and the mention of many settlers. The book is indexed. Paperback, published by Golden West Publishers, 1982.



THE STARS AND STRIPES HISTORY



GRAND UNION FLAG
 The Grand Union flag first appeared in 1775.



BETSY ROSS FLAG
 Betsy Ross introduced her design in May 1776.



13 STAR FLAG
 June 14, 1777, Continental Congress adopted this design.



15 STAR FLAG
 In 1795, "The Star Spangled Banner" had fifteen stars and stripes.



CIVIL WAR 35 STAR FLAG
 The South seceded but Lincoln didn't allow removal of stars.



OLD GLORY
 Today's U.S. flag is a recognized symbol of freedom.
