THE OLD NORTHWEST TERRITORY Speaker: Pamela Dallas

The six modern states of Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota were carved from the US lands west of Pennsylvania and northwest of the Ohio River and known as the Northwest Territory. This area has a unique history and played a special role for these and surrounding states.

Pamela Dallas has been conducting personal and client research in genealogy for over 25 years. Her focus is Midwest Research, methodology and unique record sources.

The Newbery Library in Chicago has the *Atlas of Historical County Boundaries* and it is available online at no charge. Even better, they have a page on Using the Atlas.

Delaware Public Archives - Digital Archives: https://archives.deleware.gov/exhisits-toc.shtml Lots of links to explore, however, copying content was not always successful

Hawaii State Archives: http://ags.hawaii.gov/archives/

Under 'Research our Records'/Digital Collections there are multiple links. Not all collections are complete at this time, however. Links include: Manifests, Land Records, Certificates of Registration, Probate Records, Tax Assessment Ledgers, Vital Statistics, WWI Service Records, City Directories 1880 -1924.

Alaska State Archives: http://library.alaska.gov/

On the opening page click on the Public link, where you will have several choices to search.

New Mexico Digial Collection: http://content.unm.edu

A central search portal for digital collections about New Mexico. As a service tool of the University of New Mexico Libraries, they provide access to photographs, manuscripts, posters, oral histories, maps, videos, and books from libraries, museums and cultural centers across the state.

Scroll down the page and check out the many options/links.

Lessons at Home: In addition to the varied and knowledgeable speakers we get for our EBGS meetings, you can find many lessons on the internet and enjoy them from your home, perhaps confortable in your robe and slippers A particularly good place to start is at YouTube. Go to their website and then look for "BYU Family History Library Webinars". They have 250+ offerings ranging from a few minutes to about and hour. A wide range of topics are included with something from beginner through advanced or special interest.

Both YouTube and the BYU series offer seminars on using Ancestry effectively. If you do not have an Ancestry subscription, YouTube also offers on-line lectures from Ancestry's Barefoot Genealogist.

Another source for home lessons sources is the National Archives Virtual Genealogy Fair at **www.archives.gov/calendar/genealogy-fair.** NARA replaced their on-the-ground fairs with a virtual one starting in 2013. They include a broad range of topics from across the NARA system. Learn about the existence and value of Federal Records.


A Sunday school teacher asked, "Johnny, do you think Noah did a lot of fishing when he was on the Ark?"
